**22** This question is about ethanol and bioethanol.

Thips://Britishstudentioon/bd30a.web.app. The main fuel used as a petrol substitute is bioethanol. Bioethanol is ethanol that has been produced by fermentation. The starting material is usually some form of plant material rich in starch, such as wheat, maize or potatoes. Enzymes in yeast convert this material to simple carbohydrates such as glucose (C<sub>6</sub>H<sub>12</sub>O<sub>6</sub>) and then to ethanol and carbon dioxide.

$$C_6H_{12}O_6 \rightarrow 2CH_3CH_2OH + 2CO_2$$

The mixture is left for several days until fermentation is complete. The percentage of ethanol is never greater than 15% because higher concentrations of ethanol kill the yeast.

A common blend of fuel is 95% petrol and 5% bioethanol. The engine does not need to be modified for this mixture.
