**G:** and here we have ginger we make the tea from the root this is regular ginger and this one is red ginger (4) and this is ginseng but it's kind of Indonesian ginseng in here we mix with coffee (5) {demonstrates how to clean and grind coffee beans} then after we clean like this we process like my friend do over /ɒfə/ there to roast /rʌst/ it and ground it but here for show you we not do this coffee here (.) and this is cocoa fruit and things like this one we make it chocolate (.) and then we have hibiscus you make the tea from flower it's good for cholesterol good for diet also and we have also turmeric (.) turmeric is good for antiseptic (.) this is our Mangosteen tree we make the tea only from the tree it's good for antioxidant and good for different cancer like for breast cancer also for skin is good

**Extract 2: A taxi driver is advising British tourists on travel times to the airport.**

**T:** yeah two hours (.) our flight I think our flight is twenty past four four twenty so we  
**D:** four twenty in afternoon  
**T:** yeah so we would need to be at the airport for two two thirty  
**D:** yeah around two yeah (.) you must be already there /deə/ around two  
**T:** so do you reckon from Ubud how long does it take to normally take to get here  
**D:** normal (.) normally it's one and half hours  
**T:** okay  
**D:** yeah that's er better hour it depends on the traffic but usually (.) if a customer going to airport minimum, I drive maybe two hours before (.) I think er maybe two hours' drive yeah because I didn't want to have a problem in the street  
**T:** yeah yeah understand we finish Pyramids of Chi at twelve thirty cos it's an hour and a half so that's actually a good time to go there (5)  
**D:** but today have no more plan maybe to see another place  
**T:** we're going to hang out in Ubud um and just just stay there today

**Text C - an extract from an article featured in *The Jakarta Post*, 2016. It was titled, *English in Indonesia: Is it still a matter of British or American?***

An Indonesian friend of mine recently posted a popular meme featuring Lee Min-ho, a rising South Korean star who advertises an Indonesian coffee brand juxtaposing Korean, English and Indonesian. The post has received a few comments highlighting Lee's English pronunciation.

What struck me the most is the nitpicking over one word regarded as mispronounced. Apparently, Lee's inability to pronounce the word 'white' perfectly is enough to suggest he take an English course to improve his pronunciation.

As an Indonesian studying and using English as a second language, I am only too familiar with this criticism. My Indonesian-English pronunciation is often a topic of conversation, and I constantly strive to speak like a Hollywood star. But the more I try, the more I realize that I never will.

Most Indonesians, like all others who learn English as a second language, are trained to speak like native speakers, be it American or British English.

Our English teachers seem to undervalue our social and cultural backgrounds as second-language speakers.

The emphasis to speak like those born in New York or in London sets regularity of pronunciation as a standard, relegating second-language speakers to an inferior or peripheral class.

With more and more people across the world learning and speaking English, the language no longer belongs solely to the inhabitants of those countries.

English is now spoken in multifarious ways, depending on the geographical area of the individuals, with social and cultural aspects playing essential roles in shaping and influencing the form English takes.

People from all over the world are speaking their own distinctive English: Singaporean English, Indian English, Nigerian English and many others. They have appropriated English into their own tongues. Who dares to say their English is not 'correct'?
